Scotland's Gardens Scheme is a charity dedicated to helping people open their gardens, raising funds for hundreds of charities each year, through garden gate tickets, plant sales and teas. We have a small team of staff who work hard to support our district volunteer teams and our garden openers, with advice, practical support and resources. We've been helping people to open their gardens for charity since 1931!

Our garden openers may choose a charity or good cause to support, with up to 60% of funds raised going to their own charity of choice. The remaining 40% of funds raised goes to Scotland's Gardens Scheme charity, supporting our core charities and occasional guest charities, as well as Scotland's Gardens Scheme itself. This enables us to keep supporting our volunteers and garden openers, delivering our programme of open gardens through the year.

Why open your garden with Scotland's Gardens Scheme

- We've been helping people to open their gardens since 1931!
- You'll join a great tradition of over 90 years of opening gardens for charity.
- You can choose to raise funds solely for Scotland's Gardens Scheme and our core charities. You can read more about these on our website.
- Alternatively, you can choose which charity you would like to support, with up to 60% of funds raised going to your charity of choice and the remainder going to Scotland's Gardens Scheme charity and beneficiaries. We raise around £350,000 each year for charity.
- You'll be a part of a network of garden enthusiasts throughout Scotland, with around 1000 volunteers and Garden Openers taking part each year.





- You'll also be part of one of the country's longest-standing volunteer communities.
- Your garden open days will be covered by Scotland's Gardens Scheme's Public Liability insurance.
- You'll be mentored and supported by a wonderful team of local volunteers and by our dedicated staff team.
- You'll have access to a wide range of resources to help you make your open garden a success.
- Your garden will be promoted in print, online and on social media.
- You will be invited to join us for special garden visits, our annual conference and our Online Garden Club.

What we are looking for

We welcome interesting gardens of all shapes, sizes and styles! We are proud to include a huge range of gardens in our annual programme, from cottages to castles; community gardens and allotments to re-wilded gardens and designed landscapes; walled gardens in the country and hidden urban havens.

Our visitors gain inspiration from their garden visits; they enjoy features such as planting schemes, garden design, use of seating, water and art in the garden; different gardening techniques and even a veg patch or well-turned compost heap. Visitors love the opportunity to visit places usually hidden from the public eye and to meet the people behind the gardens, sharing gardening tips and sometimes even a plant or two.

We recommend that a garden open day should offer interest for at least a 30-45 minute visit. Your local volunteer District Organiser will meet with you to discuss your interest in opening your garden. They will advise you on what is involved in opening your garden and be able to answer all your questions.

Opening as a group or village

If you feel that your garden is too small or you're not feeling confident in going it alone, why not persuade the neighbours to join in? We have many groups of gardens opening and this is very popular with visitors:

- Villages choose a suitable day or weekend to open a selection of gardens.
- Town gardens may open together, with several gardens on the same street or neighbourhood.
- Rural gardens close together may open on the same day – for example, we have an East Lothian 'Trio' of gardens that opens together one day per month from spring to autumn.

The support you'll receive

Our District Volunteer Teams

Scotland's Gardens Scheme is made up of a network of amazing volunteers around Scotland, organised into District Teams. They advise Garden Openers on what to expect and how best to plan your open days. They also liaise with Head Office to provide details to add to our national programme of garden open days.

Some Districts have event volunteers who may be able to help you out at an open day – do ask your District Organiser to advise and we encourage garden owners to enlist family and friends to help out with your opening. You may also consider approaching the charity you are supporting, so that they can be involved too, perhaps by having a presence on the day or promoting it.

The District Team has a collection of banners, arrows and signs that can be lent for your open day. They will distribute posters to promote your opening and will provide you with some for your own use to distribute locally.

Our Treasurers manage the funds raised, ensuring that all funds are entered into our database and that Garden Openers' beneficiary charities are paid.

Our Head Office Team

We have a small, very friendly team based in Edinburgh and we are always on hand to advise and help where we can. We are responsible for creating all publicity and supporting our network of volunteers and garden owners.





Promotion

If you join in with Scotland's Gardens Scheme, you will be included in our print and online publicity materials.

You will be:

- Given a dedicated listing page on our website with a selection of images.
- Listed in our famous Yellow Book.
- Included in our national leaflet, distributed all over Scotland.
- Mentioned in press and PR activities.
- Included in our twice-monthly national e-news and monthly regional e-news.
- Promoted in our social media channels and we encourage social media users to tag us so we can share up to date garden images and news.

Resources available online

We can provide a range of resources to help you organise your open day. At the beginning of the season, we will send you a link to online resources and downloadable document (hard copies available on request), on a range of topics, for example:

- Downloadable signs to print at home (e.g. arrows, Teas, No Entry etc).
- 'How To' sheets such as guidance on how to run a Plant Sale, Teas etc.
- Activity sheets for children.
- Recipes.
- Information on insurance and risk assessments.
- What to do if you need to cancel.
- Access to our private web page for garden owners.

Resources for your open day

We have many resources available to borrow from your local District Team or from Head Office, including:

- Banners, signs and arrows.
- Maps and tickets (produced by Head Office for village and group open days).
- Garden Owner and Volunteer badges.
- We provide your own bespoke posters for your open day to share in your local areas.
- Hi-vis vests (useful for parking attendants and stewards).
- Cashless payment options.



Planning your garden opening

Your District Organiser will be a great help in advising you on the different options for your garden, your area and your needs, so you can plan accordingly.

You can choose:

What

- A simple garden open day is the most common way of holding a fundraising event.
- You might consider adding a few plants for sale to help raise more funds.
- Teas and refreshments are also very popular.
 Your chosen charity may be able to help with this or your friends may be willing to bake for you.
- Any other features are dogs allowed; accessibility; special features in your garden.

How

- Opening on one or more specific dates is the most straightforward way of opening and easiest to promote.
- You can open 'by arrangement' where visitors get in touch to arrange a date and time with the owner. This can work well but you do need to work harder to promote in your local area (we can provide posters and flyers for you to share in local outlets or with local groups, such as gardening societies, ramblers or U3A).
- Choose your ticket price you can discuss this with your District Organiser.
- Cashless payments and advance bookings we still find that cash is the most popular option for visitors but Head Office can advise.

When

- Weekends are typically busier than weekdays so if (for example) your parking is limited, a weekday might suit you better.
- One-off or a series of dates you could open for a single day or multiple dates through the summer or year.
- Many Garden Openers find that having done
 the hard work, why not open for two days?
 This can lessen the risk of being rained off if
 you have poor weather on one day. You might
 also consider opening for longer than just an
 afternoon. For example, opening from 10 5
 could mean that more visitors are able to
 attend than if you opened from 2 5.

Where the money goes


- You can choose to donate 100% of funds raised to Scotland's Gardens Scheme and our core charities - read more about these on our website.
- Alternatively, you may choose your charity up to 60% of funds raised may be donated to your charity or cause of choice, with the remaining 40% going to support Scotland's Gardens Scheme charity and our core beneficiary charities.
- Your local Treasurer will send you a donation form before or around your opening date; this should be completed and returned to the Treasurer along with any funds raised. The Treasurer will then pay your chosen charity on your behalf.
- We ask that all funds raised come to SGS including teas and plant sales and we will pay your charity or good cause on your behalf.
